	<ul> <li>Kyle Benham</li> <li>Shared that Durham Region Home Building Association survey will be emailed to all members. Input is important to help City and Region make key decisions.</li> </ul>

Status of Task Force Action Items	<ul> <li>Kyle Benham provided a summary on key task force action items</li> <li>City and Durham partners (BDCD) was successful in securing a Digital Main Street grant of \$95,000. Expect the program will be launched within two weeks</li> <li>Reanimating downtown core project is currently underway with six Ontario Tech University students</li> </ul>
