	<ul> <li>Ontario Structured Psychotherapy program. Rolled out 3</li> </ul>
	years ago.
	The program is a Cognitive Behavioral Therapy
	(C.B.T.) service to individuals with mild to moderate
	depression and anxiety. Anyone can access this
	through a referral from a General Practitioner (G.P.).
	Additional Services include the Prompt Care Clinic,      Primary Care Telephone Cancult Services and
	Primary Care Telephone Consult Services and Specialized Clinics
	Several services have been developed during COVID-19
	to support essential workers.
	Health Care Worker Assist. A health care worker
	can call in at any time of the day without a G.P.'s
	referral. Brief individualized therapy is offered and
	referrals to other programs if needed.
	<ul> <li>First Responder Assist. A slightly more intense</li> </ul>
	therapy is provided.
	Stacy Hawkins inquired about where individuals should
	be turning if a child requires mental health assistance if
	they have been exposed to a traumatizing event.

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	<ul> <li>Mayor Carter mentioned that changes are being made at Mary Street Parking Garages to deter incidents with individuals dealing with mental health struggles.</li> <li>Chair Marimpietri noted that mothers who are maintaining a household, running a business and more may feel the additional pressures as well as the children.</li> <li>Self-care is important. Take time for yourself and give yourself a break, perfection is not the most important thing.</li> </ul>
5. Roundtable Update	<ul> <li>Chair Marimpietri</li> <li>Issues with the supply chain. Prices being void after 48 hours and supply lists not adequate to demand.</li> <li>Jeff Robinson</li> <li>General Motors job site continues to grow.</li> <li>Permit applications continue to be sent out for General Motors.</li> <li>Retooling may ramp up to 500 people in the next month or so.</li> <li>No COVID-19 cases through the job sites.</li> <li>Materials continue to be a concern.</li> <li>Last wave and recent shut down has been a challenge for employees.</li> <li>Mayor Carter inquired about what he is doing in his work environment to help his team during this time.</li> <li>Team building sessions. Online items available like online euchre night. Let employees know they are appreciated and supported.</li> <li>Roger Bouma</li> <li>Real Estate continues to do well. Important to remember there are many industries that are really struggling.</li> <li>523 homes sold in Oshawa in March. Last year, the best year ever, we averaged 275 homes per month. The best month on record was March 2017, with 396 homes sold. This March we sold 30-35% more homes than ever before in one month in the City of Oshawa.</li> <li>Values are up 36% year over year.</li> <li>Inventory is up but buyers are keeping pace.</li> <li>Mayor Carter noted that he has heard that financial institutions are beginning to feel concerned about pricing and inventory and believe that the real estate industry may face problems moving forward. Durham Region has closed the gap in the G.T.A. and individuals are seeing places of value in our community and changes in work habits has seen people moving east.</li> <li>Prices are not sustainable.</li> <li>The possibility of Capital Gains on principle residence.</li> <li>Mayor Carter inquired about what he is doing in his work environment to help his team during this time.</li> <li>Check in with each other from time to time.</li> </ul>

	Zoo share project is in motion. Electrons and thermal power is being delivered to the Zoo through an anaerobic digester.
